Dear Friends:

Reflecting back on an entire year of SNAP's service in the community, the vast appreciation I have for my dedicated colleagues is taken up a notch – something I didn't think was possible.

I feel honored to be part of an effort that provided a hand-up to nearly 50,000 of my neighbors in 2017. Because of SNAP, I know that homes were warmer and safer. I know that businesses were opened and jobs were created. I know some who once called the street their home are now housed and secure.

All these accomplishments and more leave me feeling glad – but not content. There is still plenty of work to be done.

We saw the power of collaboration manifest itself in several forms last year. SNAP teamed with the city of Spokane and other social service agencies to find homes for 102 formerly homeless youth in a matter of 100 days. Thanks to the initiative and support of former SNAP Board Chair John Hemmingson, we were part of a group effort that brought the documentary "A Walk Through Poverty" to our community. The project continues to generate important conversations about a topic that is not accustomed to the spotlight – but should be.

Leading SNAP is both a tremendous responsibility and privilege. I am reminded of this every day. While the workload is substantial, I take heart knowing the reinforcement I receive from our board, committee members, staff, volunteers and donors – all extraordinary in their own right – will always be there as a steadfast foundation. I may have the title of "CEO," but I'm only one part of a remarkable team that

is committed to making the greater Spokane community stronger and more resilient.

I have developed an affinity for our unique SNAP calendar that includes the gathering of our entire energy assistance crew when the first signs of autumn's chill are in the air. It is around that same time that our fundraising lunch, the "Ode to Opportunity" takes place at the Spokane Convention Center. For me, this annual event is nothing short of a joyous reunion of SNAP supporters who have made us what we are today. It is also a chance to educate and welcome those new to our cause.

Regardless of the month or season, SNAP remains committed to helping our neighbors exit poverty. The reworking of our mission statement last year placed enhanced emphasis on our role in helping people achieve their potential. Whether it be a family's first house, an entrepreneur's first business or simply a vital repair that helped someone remain safely in their home, being part of these accomplishments represents a unique reward that goes beyond a paycheck for all of us here at SNAP.

While our 51st year may not have featured the pomp and circumstance of SNAP's half-century celebration in 2016, it was special in its own way. We launched the Ride to Care program in early 2017 with an impressive collection of community partners and, although in its early stages, we saw how the approach has the capability to change the landscape of low-acuity medical transportation.

There were many other highlights in 2017, some of which are featured in this report. Many others are captured in the hearts of residents who are now thriving thanks to SNAP. I am indeed thankful and proud to be part of this very special place.

Since moving to the U.S. in 2014, Ali has hit the ground running. In just over three years, he has become fluent in English and began volunteering as a translator.

After coming to SNAP, Ali made it a personal goal to purchase his first home and set out to make it happen. By generating savings with an Individual Development Savings Account and saving additional money, he secured his downpayment and completed the homebuying seminar, qualifying him for our pre-purchase counseling.

"When I came to the United States, I said before I apply for the (U.S.) citizenship, 'I have to finish my GED diploma and I have to buy my first house,' so that was my goal. I now have my house and I am currently working on my GED diploma. I have made a program for my life." — Ali

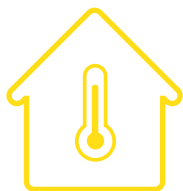

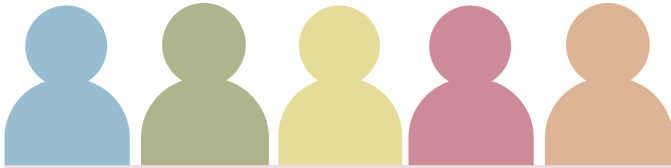

In the fall of 2016, Dr. Darin Neven, a physician in the Providence Sacred Heart Medical Center emergency room, described what a new program called “Spokane Ride to Care” would mean to the Spokane community.

“PATIENTS ARE GOING TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO GET THE RIGHT CARE AT THE RIGHT PLACE AT A MORE REASONABLE COST,” said Neven.

Facilitated by SNAP, Spokane Ride to Care launched in January 2017 as the area’s first low-acuity mobile transport program, **OFFERING A MORE EFFICIENT OPTION FOR PATIENTS DEALING WITH ISSUES THAT RANGE FROM BACK PAIN TO TOOTHACHES THAT COULD BE BETTER TREATED AT AN URGENT CARE FACILITY.** More than half of the 911 calls addressed by the Spokane Fire Department (SFD) are for such conditions.

Spokane Ride to Care offers patients the option of being transported by a SNAP-contracted vehicle to urgent care instead of by ambulance to an emergency room.

The pilot program began as a partnership between SNAP, the city of Spokane, SFD, commercial insurers, managed care organizations and urgent care centers. In August 2017, the Spokane Valley Fire Department started offering Spokane Ride to Care.

“It’s changing the paradigm,” said SNAP Medical Transportation Coordinator Cameryn Flynn.

When faced with a failing furnace during a Spokane winter, Ted, a 70-year-old Air Force veteran, wasn't sure what he was going to do. Both he and his caretaker neighbor, Cindy, were frightened for his health and safety and he didn't want to leave his home. Cindy searched for a solution and Spokane County Veterans Services referred her to SNAP's Home Repair program, which enables low-income homeowners to accomplish minor home repairs, addressing in-home health and safety deficiencies. Zero heat situations are prioritized, especially for seniors. A plan was made to replace his furnace through grant funding from Spokane County, Spokane Valley Rotary and Aging and Long Term Care of Eastern Washington. A new carbon monoxide detector was also installed by SNAP's contractor, giving Cindy and Ted additional piece of mind.

IN 2017, SNAP HOMELESS SERVICES HELPED 448 HOUSEHOLDS TRANSITION FROM HOMELESSNESS TO PERMANENT HOUSING, WHILE SERVING 2,313 HOUSEHOLDS COMPRISED OF 3,179 INDIVIDUALS.

SNAP SERVES AS SPOKANE COUNTY'S LEAD AGENCY FOR THE SINGLES HOMELESS COORDINATED ASSESSMENT (SHCA) PROGRAM AND, **IN 2017, COMPLETED 1,909 ASSESSMENTS TO HELP CONNECT INDIVIDUALS TO HOUSING RESOURCES.** SNAP'S RAPID REHOUSING PROGRAM PROVIDES SHORT-TO MEDIUM-TERM RENTAL ASSISTANCE AS WELL AS SUPPORT SERVICES TO HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS WHILE THE AGENCY'S YOUNG ADULT HOUSING PROGRAMS PROVIDE RAPID REHOUSING AND TRANSITIONAL HOUSING TO YOUNG ADULTS, 18-24. ONE OF THOSE YOUNG ADULTS IS REIKO, WHO CREDITS SNAP AND HOUSING SPECIALIST CANDI POE WITH HELPING HIM FIND HOUSING – AS WELL AS DIRECTION AND HOPE.

ON JULY 31, 2017, THE CITY OF SPOKANE HELD A PRESS CONFERENCE TO ANNOUNCE THAT A UNIQUE CHALLENGE HAD BEEN MET – A TOTAL OF 102 FORMERLY HOMELESS YOUTH HAD BEEN HOUSED OVER A SPAN OF 100 DAYS.



The challenge was collaboration between the city and a collection of social service agencies including SNAP, Volunteers of America, Catholic Charities, Excelsior Youth Center and more. Job training and counseling were included in the follow-up to the challenge.

As part of the campaign, SNAP began a youth-focused coordinated entry and referral program for youth 18 to 24 (and emancipated minors) to expedite the process of securing safe and reliable housing.

The 100-day idea was initiated on the statewide level by **A Way Home Washington**, a group dedicated to ending youth homelessness, with financial support from the Schultz Family Foundation and the Raikes Foundation.

Noreen tells the story of one resident she has known for two years who suffered a stroke that left her partially paralyzed and seriously affected her speech. Accompanied by her therapy dog, Noreen is making a positive impact with this resident and many others.

"Were it not for the insightful training I received through the ombuds program I would not have known how to reach her," Noreen said. "Looking into her eyes and seeing hope and comfort in the knowledge that she had a voice and could be heard. I could be that woman with my life altered. I have never seen a family member visit or a friend but it is delightful to discover with her the magic that lies within and to see her face light up." Noreen is truly living out the LTCO mission statement in her work as a volunteer: "Ensuring the dignity, rights and well-being of individuals living in long-term care – today and tomorrow." "I am so proud to be in a place where I can be the difference," Noreen says.
